BULLYING: Bully behavior occurs when there is deliberate intent to harm, dominate, inflict pain, exclude or otherwise cause distress to the person being targeted. The person who bullies purposefully misuses his/her power (size, age, popularity, confidence, verbal ability), usually repeatedly. The balance of power between the bully and target is NOT EQUAL.

Anger is the only emotion that never exists on its own. This is how it is in all of us. It's a human thing, not a deficiency thing. It exists to block other more difficult emotions from rising to the surface. They are the emotions that can make any of us feel smaller or more vulnerable, but it can take time for our children to learn how to feel them and express them in a way that feels safe for them. In the meantime, anger will act like a shield that stops those emotions and vulnerabilities from surfacing.

Empathy softens their shield. Curiosity softens ours. The question to ask is, 'What might they (or I) be feeling right now if anger was out of the way?' Shame? Disappointment? Anxiety? Disconnection? Fear? Then - and this is tough - if you can, see through the anger to the need or feeling that might be underneath it.

The idea is to respond in a way that makes it safe for the shield to go down and for their vulnerabilities to peek out. 'I can see how angry you are. I really want to understand what's happening for you. Can we talk about it? Whatever you're feeling is okay with me. I just want to understand what you need.' Think of it as making space for uncertain, beautiful, powerful things.

Anger is a valid feeling and it's okay for it to be there, but when it shows itself fiercely it can send the feelings and needs it is protecting deeper under cover and further out of reach.

Dealing with difficult feelings takes time for our kids to learn, and that's okay. Many of us are still learning ourselves. (Does the learning ever really stop?) Over time, if we give them enough of the experiences they need to feel those feelings and to open up to us (and we don't need to get it right all the time) they will learn that it's okay for them to let their vulnerabilities peek out, come out and be soothed - by them, by time, or by the people who love them.
