Welcome back to one of the finest learning communities you could hope to experience. I love Poly Drive and could not be more proud to be part of it! Our improvements to the building continued over the summer, thanks to the Billings community and the bonds they passed four years ago. We received new roofing, our gym was refinished and improvements were made to most of our sidewalks. In addition we now are a 1-to-1 school meaning every child in the building will have an iPad or Chromebook assigned to them as a tool for learning. Dogs

I'm always impressed at the number of parents that walk to pick their children up after school. When the weather is nice I've noticed many families bring their dogs to pick up students as well. The district has a guideline in place indicating dogs are not allowed on school property. Regardless of how sweet you may feel your dog is, there is still an element of unpredictability and in the past students have been bitten by dogs on school property. Some parents have expressed concerns to me about children being frightened, the possibility of dog bites and student allergies. It only takes one child to be bitten by a dog to recognize the seriousness of this. Please do not bring your animal onto school grounds unless you have paperwork for a service animal. If you walk your animal, please wait off school grounds. I love dogs, but I love our kids' safety even more. If you have any questions concerning this matter, please do not hesitate to contact me. HEAD LICE REMINDER

This is a reminder that head lice are a community problem brought into the schools unintentionally by unsuspecting children. The peak time that children become infested with head lice is in the summer. because of sleep-away camps, slumber parties, and vacationing. However, because head lice are so small, and because symptoms of itching may not develop for weeks or even months after infestation, parents and children alike often do not even know there is a problem unless the parent inspects a child's head closely and often.

This is the time of year in the Fall when we start to see some cases of head lice on children in school. This is a good opportunity to begin looking carefully through your young child's scalp at least once a day if you notice that your child is scratching their scalp more than usual. If you see any stage of the head louse, nits (eggs) attached to the hair shaft that are hard to remove or live lice, your child needs to be treated. and the nits removed before you send your child back to school.

Adequate treatment requires four ounces per six

inches of hair of an overthe-counter product you choose and use exactly according to package instructions, which may include repeating the treatment in a week to ten days.

As children participate in physical education and other school activities, close contact can occur. especially in contact activities or sports. There are inherent risks to all close contact activities and sports, including the transmission of various infections or infestations. like impetigo, scabies, ringworm, and lice. We encourage parents to inspect their children on a regular basis and to discuss any medical concerns they notice with their private health care providers. Your own physician is an excellent resource for you if you have any questions or if you find that an over-thecounter treatment does not help.

Head lice are a nuisance, but they are treatable and are not life threatening. -PMI Health Office

REMEMBER, THE SINGLE MOST IMPORTANT WAY TO PREVENT A HEAD LICE PROBLEM IN SCHOOL IS SURVEILLANCE BY THE PARENT AT HOME. Thank you for your cooperation.



PARKING ISSUES

As you know Poly Drive School has struggled for several years with traffic issues on our campus. As the neighborhood grew we were pinched in and options are limited. However, student safety is paramount.

Please remember that the north entrance (main entrance with the No Drop Off Zone sign) is not to be used for the dropping off and picking up of children at entry and dismissal times. This is a safety issue during a high traffic volume time.

In order to maintain a safe environment for our students, we have established some guidelines for vehicles dropping off and picking up students at Poly Drive Elementary. Please read and follow the following protocols:

- Children's safety first!
- Obey all traffic rules and speed limits
- Students are not supervised until 8:05, so please drop off students between 8:05 and 8:20
- Do not park or drop off in front of the parking lot entrance or wheel chair ramp at front doors
- When dropping off students in front of the school on Poly Dr., have them
 use the crosswalk and sidewalks do not climb down rocky areas or
 cross areas without crossing marks
- Do not pull through parking area to drop off students if you must drop off large materials or check in at the office, please do so prior to 8:05, after 8:25 or park on one of our surrounding streets
- If parking in the lot during the day, please respect no-parking and handicap areas
- If exiting the parking lot, be aware of the new merge area with the alley people in the alley have right-of-way
- Do not park in the yellow bus zone on Poly Drive in front of the school
- If using the alley for drop-off, park on the west side of the alley and drop
 off in areas where students can access the school grounds quickly be
 aware of students exiting cars if you want to wait with your child in the
 car, please do so on one of the surrounding streets so traffic can flow
 more easily

BULLYING: Bully behavior occurs when there is deliberate intent to harm, dominate, inflict pain, exclude or otherwise cause distress to the person being targeted. The person who bullies purposefully misuses his/her power (size, age, popularity, confidence, verbal ability), usually repeatedly. The balance of power between the bully and target is NOT EQUAL.

After-school conversations between parents and children can be short and sweet and sometimes it can even sound like this: Parent: "How was your day? Student: "Fine." Parent: "What did you do?" Student: "Nothing." Does this sound familiar? In this month's copy of *Home & School Connection*, I found a helpful article with tips and strategies towards having meaningful two-way conversations with your child.

"Let's see what you brought home." Looking at completed work to find out what your child is learning and how they are doing. If you find forms or letters that require your signature, please do so and put them back in their folder to return to school ASAP.

"Show me what you have for homework." Be sure to ask your child to explain the assignment to you so that you are sure that they understand the homework. After your child is finished, take a moment and glance over the work to see that it is complete.

"Tell me what you learned that you would like to know more about." You child's answer can give you a jumping off place for exploring learning together.

Here a few more ideas to help your child recall his/her day.

- "What's the coolest thing that happened? What wasn't so cool?"
- "Pretend you're the teacher. How would you describe the day?"
- "What made you laugh?"
- "What was the most creative thing you did?"
- "How were you kind or helpful today? Was anyone kind or helpful to you?"
